Documented from the Rolls and Files of the Coram Regibus of Thomas Byron et Ariella, Rex et Regina Eshelmearc. Being a True Record of the Business of Their Majesties Final Court at the 23rd Annual Harvest Raid.

...

Their Majesties also invited Sir Ian Kennoven before Them, and then Convened those members of the Most Noble Order of the Laurel present. They then commended him unto the Order's care to continue to advise him as he considered induction into their number.

Their Majesties then desired the attendance of Lægair Mac Conaill Meic Shiadakhail. Citing his contributions to the Gazette and his dedication to fighting, Their Majesties were minded to Award him Arms. Scroll by Lady Felice de Thornton.

At a loss for how to ensure the security of the Kingdom, His Majesty called for His Seneschal, Duke Christopher Rawlyns, who reminded him Of a tournament held not long ago, and that the winner of that tournament, Prince Marcus, was the lawful Heir to the Sylvan Throne. Prince Marcus also came forward to assert his claim and fill the void left by the "disappointing children" of Their Majesties bodies. Duke Malcolm, on behalf of the Earl Marshal, also affirmed that the tournament was lawful, and Marcus the uncontested winner, and thus heir to the throne. Dame Arefna, Mistress of the Lists, also proclaimed to all assembled that the tournament had been held in accordance with the laws and policies, that all had conducted themselves with chivalry, and

that Marcus had emerged the victor on that day. Finally, the Silver Buckle Herald confirmed that Marcus and Margerite were crowned Prince and Princess upon that day, and that their parents had been duly appointed.

Hearing these words, Their Majesties were gladdened to know that They would not leave the kingdom unattended. His Majesty asked the Prince for a little time in which to conclude Their business, and the Prince granting this request, withdrew.

Therefore, the Order of the Laurel was invited to join Their Majesties in Their Court. Duke Mathew Blackleaf then came forward as a royal peer and spoke of Sir Ian's exceptional service, how he inspires others, and how he has an understanding of the nuances of the kingdom. Speaking for the Order of Chivalry Sir Otto of Westphalia spoke of how Sir Ian's chivalry is not just confined to the list, but that he is honorable and humble in all aspects of his life and conduct. Master Anias Fenn spoke on behalf of the Order of Defense regarding that nebulous something that Sir Ian has to inspire others who are in his presence. Master Filippo de Sancto Martino spoke for the Order of Pelican to Sir Ian's service when no one else watches, how he has persevered and learned through failure and is not afraid to fail, how he finds ways to overcome the impossible, and serves with joy while living The Dream. Master Meszaros Janos spoke of Sir Ian as one who is both skilled as an artist and a scientist and how rare a trait this is. He spoke of how Sir Ian will bring this trait to the Order and how the Order and the Kingdom would benefit. Hearing the words of these peers, Their Sylvan Majesties were moved to induct Sir Ian into the Order of the Laurel. They called for a hood to cover his head, a pin to let others know of his new station, a wreath of laurels to crown his brow, and a fruitcake to fill his belly. Having regaled him thus, Their Majesties received his oath and proclaimed him to the populace as a Companion of the Order of the Laurel. Scroll, in the form of a round shield, was constructed by Master Caoineán Searchaidh and Mistress Cynthia Love of Tower, with words by Duchess Dorinda Courtenay.

Heronster Demo Report: The Fredonia Maker Faire

It was a very blustery day. Dinnie the Pook and Piglet left their homes in the Hundred Acre Wood and...

Cops, wrong story. It was a very blustery day. My wife and I left our home at dawn to drive to the State University of NY at Fredonia to start setting up our demo for the first Fredonia Maker Faire.

It was originally planned that we would be outside the new science building so fighters and fencers could fight on the lawn. A couple of the officials decided it was too cold and windy and rainy and just too darn blustery. So they got a couple of volunteers to help us re-pack our stuff and transport it all to the Williams Center and help us re-set up. The volunteers all wore bright yellow t-shirts to identify themselves. Naturally, the exhibitors promptly renamed them Makers' Minions. With their aid, we were fully set-up before the faire opened.

The faire was originally supposed to be just the Science Building, but they got so many exhibitor responses that they extended the faire into the next building and there were exhibits in both the Science Building and the Williams Center. Nearly 100 exhibits in all. We got the second floor of the Williams Center all to ourselves. The main hall in the Williams Center is two stories tall. The second floor wraps around it like a ring with pillars forming niches all along the balcony side. The organizers put up an extra sign announcing "The Shire" was upstairs.

We draped banners off the balconies to hang down into the central hall. We set up an armor display in the first niche along with a chainmail making demo. In the second niche, we set up miscellaneous display objects including embroidery, garb, heraldry and a medieval cookbook. In the third niche, we set up a calligraphy and illumination display with a illumination demo. When the fencers arrived, they took over the fourth niche for their weapons and gear.

Master Otfried Ammertaler and m'lady Artemisa da Manarola arrived from the Rhydderich Hael just before the official opening. Lord Coinneich Mac an Leigh and T.H.L. Clarissa da Svizzera from Thescore came shortly afterward. The doors opened and we had a slow but steady stream of fair-goers. We announced the teaching of a few simple country dances, and Artemisia, the Hael's dance mistress, led the audience through them.

When our fencers, Lord Hjorn Einarsson and Baron Jacob of Dunmoore arrived and armored up, I announced from the balcony that there had been a falling out amongst the king's musketeers and matters were to be settled by the sword. This was not choreographed, nor rehearsed nor pre-determined. Skill alone would decide the winner. Within two minutes nearly everyone from the hall below was now upstairs packed solidly from wall to wall awaiting the combat.

Jacob and Hjorn gave a wonderful display of skill. When they stopped, we had dozens of people by our tables, trying on jackets, helms, coifs, surcoats, gauntlets, swords and bucklers while we talked about the SCA.

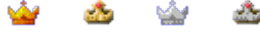

Many amenities surround the site. Wegman's, restaurants, and hotels are within minutes of the site. Available hotels are the Super 8, Hilton Garden Inn, and Days Inn. The site is located just 15 minutes from I-19 St 90.

Directions:

From I-19 Thruway/ I-90: Take Exit 40. Turn right onto Rt 34 south and drive for approximately 9.5 miles/15 minutes. Route 34 turns into South Street. The site will be on the right. Turn right onto Fitch Street to park. Use second entrance on right.

From the south east side of the kingdom: Take Rt 81 North. Exit to Rt 79 west. Follow Rt 79 into Ithaca. Then take Route 34 north. Route 34 turns into South Street once in Auburn. It is approximately 36.5 miles/45 minutes to site from Ithaca. The site will be on the left. Turn left onto Fitch Street to park. Use second entrance on the right.

From central areas of the kingdom: Take your best route to Rt 86/Southern Tier Expressway to Horseheads, NY. Take Rt 13 northeast approximately 64 miles/1.5 hours to Ithaca. Take Rt 13 through Ithaca. Take the NY-34 West towards Stewart Park/Auburn. Turn left onto NY 34 North. Follow NY 34 approximately 35 miles to Auburn. Route 34 turns into South Street. The site will be on the left. Turn left onto Fitch Street to park. Use second entrance on the right.
